



Getting started with Letter-join at home

Ask your class teacher for the Pupil log-in details. These will include how to log in on any computer or tablet. Click the Desktop or Tablet button then choose your class name or Free Play.

How to log in

Select your child's class name from the menu, or if you don't know it, click Free Play.






Worksheets for handwriting practice


Under the 'Fun' tab you'll find lots of activities designed to offer touch-screen tracing practice for your children at home.

Magic Patterns can be used to trace Letter-join's pre-writing patterns and other shapes in a choice of fun palettes. Magic Words allows any word to be typed onto the screen and then traced over using a finger or a stylus for letter and word practice.

Write it Right! rewards neat handwriting with a picture gallery of children's handwritten words. Children can trace words that match pictures with fun sounds and animations encouraging them to play and practise letter shapes.


Children can hear the sounds and practise tracing them on iPads or tablets. The Phonics activities will be displayed in the font chosen by your child's class teacher.

Touch-screen tracing practice for pupils at home

Letter-join's pre-writing patterns are grouped into logical sets of similar shapes, and each pattern is animated, accompanied by exciting sounds.

Finer control can be gained by finger writing on tablets or with a pencil using the worksheets.


Worksheets consist of lines of patterns for tracing using a pencil or crayon and a simple drawing which can be 'coloured-in' using the patterns of that group.

Letter Families

Long ladders, curly caterpillars, one-armed robots and zig-zag letters, Letter-join's Letter Families worksheets can be printed out for tracing and copying. To strengthen letter formation and to learn which letters belong to each family, try the Letter Families touch-screen activity, under the 'Fun' tab.





Longer passages of text, written speedily and neatly are the handwriting targets of Key Stage 2. Letter-join resources, from printable worksheets to digital activities, include dictation exercises and games and puzzles, which help develop handwriting to this higher level.

The Key Stage 2 Printouts tab in Letter-join's Resources section has many practice worksheets. They cover a selection of curriculum topics and are perfect for real handwriting practice at home.






Word Search




Pencil grip and sitting position


Holding a pencil correctly can help handwriting be more controlled and comfortable

Both right and left handed children should be encouraged to use the tripod grip which allows the pen/pencil to be held securely whilst allowing controlled movements of the pen/pencil nib.


- 1 Grip the pencil with your index finger and thumb with the nib pointing away.
- 2 With your free hand, spin the pencil from underneath.
- 3 Use your middle finger to support the underside of the pencil.








Positioning for left-handed children
